E-bike safety rules

What safety measures must be followed when riding an e-bike or e-scooter?

To ride an e-bike, you must:

- be at least 16 years old.
- wear an approved motorcycle or bike helmet.
- follow regulations like other cyclists.
- maintain your e-bike in good working order.

To ride an e-scooter, you must:

- be at least 16 years old.
- stand at all times while riding.
- wear a bicycle helmet.

Safe riding etiquette includes:

- keeping your device in good working order.
- following the same rules of the road as other cyclists.
- obeying the rules of the road.



Where can these devices be operated? **E-bikes and e-scooters are not allowed to operate on sidewalks.** E-bikes and e-scooters are allowed to operate on bike lanes, cycle tracks, in-boulevard multi-use paths and local roads with a speed limit at or less than 50 kilometers per hour, as long as the device meets the Ministry of Transportation's requirements for [e-bikes](#) and [e-scooters](#).

What are the speed limits?

The maximum assisted speed for e-bikes is 32 kilometres per hour. The maximum operating speed for e-scooters is 24 kilometres per hour.

Summer maintenance underway

Seasonal maintenance is in full swing! Public Works teams are working hard to keep Vaughan’s public spaces clean and beautiful. Since spring, 346 tonnes of litter have been cleared. Crews have repaired more than 660 potholes, maintained stormwater ponds, planted shrub beds and installed 735 baskets and 800 planters. Hydrant inspections are underway, with more than 1,900 completed. Grass cutting occurs biweekly and garden bed renovations are ongoing this summer.

Dirt, oil, grease, rust, salt, anti-freeze, soap and other chemicals from your car can damage the storm sewer system if they enter a catch basin. Ensure the water you’re using to clean your vehicle does not flow into a catch basin, and you’re using environmentally friendly products.

Did you know backyard composting can decrease your household’s curbside waste by up to 30 per cent? Compost is the natural process of recycling organic matter, such as food scraps, into a valuable fertilizer that enriches soil and plants.

You can buy a backyard composter from the City online at vaughan.ca/ServiceVaughan. All City backyard composters include instructions on how to turn your fruit and vegetable scraps and leaf and yard materials into garden fertilizer.

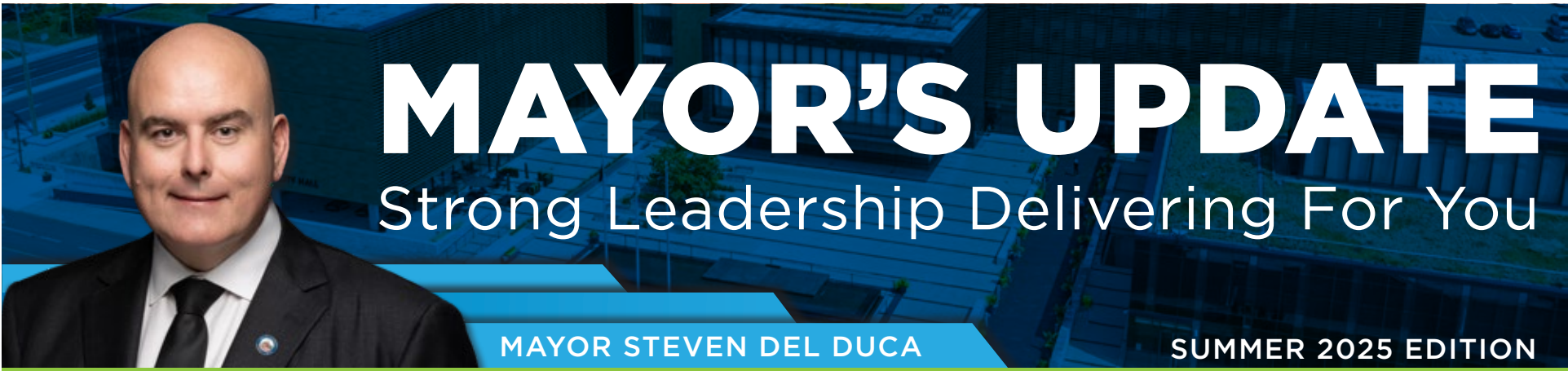

Together, Making Progress on Housing Affordability and Creating a Stronger Community



The Province of Ontario is investing \$20 million in Vaughan through the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program (MHIP) to support the city's expanding housing needs.

This funding will help unlock land for more than 14,000 new homes and support Vaughan's population growth. As part of this initiative, the City of Vaughan is contributing \$22 million to widen Applewood Crescent to Jane Street, a project that will support new housing developments and economic growth.

The funding supports Vaughan's long-term plan to build 42,000 new homes by 2032. Infrastructure improvements are essential steps to speed up home construction.



CDAA Bridge project advancing on schedule

Steady progress continues on the Canada Drive–America Avenue (CDAA) Bridge, a pivotal infrastructure project in Vaughan designed to enhance connectivity and reduce traffic congestion. This initiative is a cornerstone of Mayor Steven Del Duca's Nine-Point Action Plan to Fight Traffic Gridlock.

In April 2025, a significant milestone was achieved with the successful installation of bridge girders over Highway 400, effectively linking Canada Drive and America Avenue. This development marks a major step toward the bridge's anticipated completion in 2026.

The Canada Drive–America Avenue Bridge is part of Vaughan's broader strategy to fight traffic gridlock. Other projects under Mayor Del Duca's Nine-Point Action Plan include the Kirby Road extension and the Bass Pro Mills Drive extension. These initiatives collectively aim to enhance Vaughan's transportation network and alleviate traffic congestion.

Mayor Steven Del Duca requests control of key Regional roads to advance road projects

The City of Vaughan is requesting control of several key regional roads as part of Mayor Steven Del Duca's plan to help fight traffic gridlock and ease congestion.

Mayor Del Duca has called on York Region to transfer jurisdiction over the these road segments:

- Teston Road from Keele Street to Dufferin Street
- The Langstaff Road connection, east of Creditstone Road to Keele Street
- Highway 7, between Pine Valley Drive and Martin Grove Road

The request is part of a broader push to give Vaughan more authority over local infrastructure, aiming to improve responsiveness in planning and service delivery.

Mayor Del Duca urges Prime Minister Mark Carney to act on Bubble Legislation

Mayor Steven Del Duca has called on newly elected Prime Minister Mark Carney to swiftly fulfill a key campaign promise: introducing federal legislation aimed at protecting places of worship, schools and community centres from hate-motivated harassment and intimidation.

In a letter dated May 1, Mayor Del Duca urged Prime Minister Carney to address the growing threat of hate and extremism across Canada. He has called on the Prime Minister to fulfill his pledge to criminalize the obstruction and targeting of vulnerable infrastructure, such as all places of worship, calling it both necessary and urgent.

Mayor Del Duca pointed to Vaughan's own efforts, specifically the Protecting Vulnerable Social Infrastructure By-law, which was enacted to empower local enforcement officers to intervene in cases of intimidation or threats against those accessing public institutions.

The City of Vaughan was the first municipality in Canada to pass this kind of by-law to protect our most vulnerable residents. Advocacy on behalf of the Mayor will continue until the provincial and the federal governments are able to establish similar legislation around all places of worship.

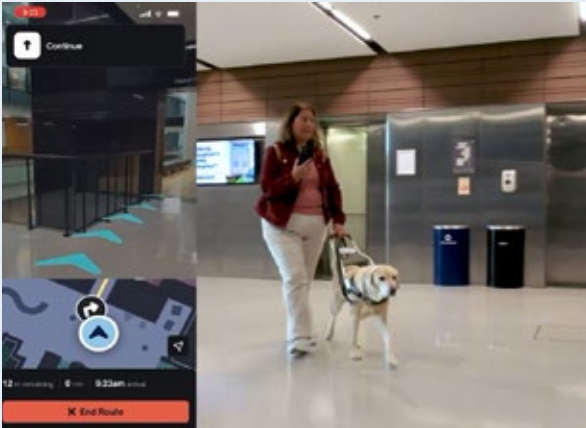

Advancing accessibility in our facilities



The City of Vaughan continues to take significant steps forward in its commitment to advancing accessibility. In December 2024, the City, in partnership with CNIB Access Labs, officially launched a Wayfinding Pilot Project that uses innovative technology to advance accessibility in several City facilities.

With the use of a free specialized app called GoodMaps: Indoor Navigation, people with vision-related disabilities and other diverse visitors, including people who use wheelchairs or mobility devices, can access precise turn-by-turn directions via guided audio or

visual navigation to independently find their way around the following six City facilities:

- Vaughan City Hall (2141 Major Mackenzie Dr.)
- Chancellor Community Centre and Ansley Grove Library (250 Ansley Grove Rd.)
- Civic Centre Resource Library (2191 Major Mackenzie Dr.)
- Dufferin Clark Community Centre and Dufferin Clark Library (1441 Clark Ave. W.)
- North Thornhill Community Centre and Pleasant Ridge Library (300 Pleasant Ridge Ave.)
- Pierre Berton Resource Library (4921 Rutherford Rd.)

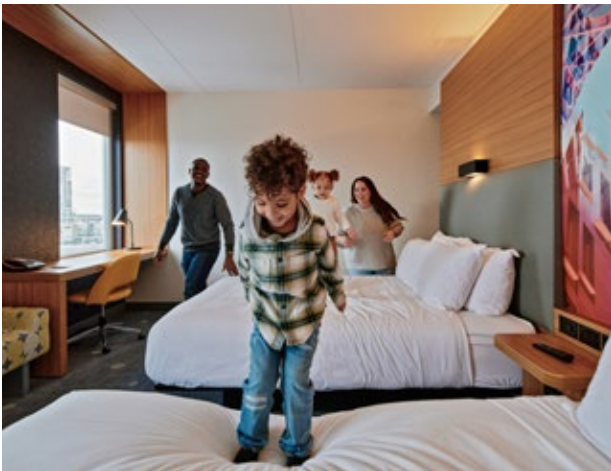

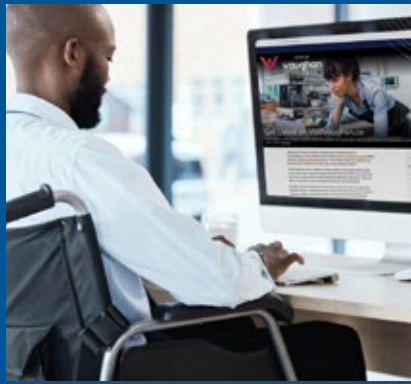
