Fix the broken criminal justice system



In September, our community suffered a tragedy that should never have happened. Abdul Aleem Farooqi was killed during a home invasion – in front of his wife and children. A family was shattered, and a community is still grieving.

Vaughan residents are anxious, angry and demanding action – and they are right to do so. Criminals must be behind bars, not out on bail, victimizing our people.

As your Mayor, I will not accept this as the new normal in Vaughan. These crimes are not random – they are the direct result of a broken bail and criminal justice system that has too often released repeat violent offenders back onto our streets.

We need strong, clear legislation from the federal government passed now. Reforms that keep violent offenders off our streets and protect our communities are long overdue. Here in Vaughan, we're doing everything we can to keep you safe, including:

- Two new York Regional Police (YRP) substations, one in Kleinburg and the other in the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre to help increase local police presence.
- A \$441.5-million police budget for 2025 up 7.7 per cent adding more than 300 new YRP staff by 2026.
- Paying for more crime-fighting CCTV cameras that focus on stolen cars and technology that detects gunshots being fired.

But no one municipality can fix this alone. Local communities don't have the resources or the authority to fix the system. Our bail laws and the criminal justice system are the responsibility of both our federal and provincial governments. We need tougher laws and a properly financed court system. Only an all-hands-on-deck effort will get the job done.

We will do our part to demand a criminal justice system that prioritizes our residents. One that protects you – not one that protects the criminals themselves.

Enough is enough. Fix the system – and fix it now.





Vaughan fights crime

Over the last few months, Vaughan has experienced serious crimes. Too many violent offenders are being released back onto our streets. While we wait for the federal government to fix the broken criminal justice system, we're taking action.

Mayor Del Duca and Deputy Mayor Jackson brought forward a Members' Resolution for the City to purchase up to 10 new crime-fighting CCTV cameras, equipped with technology to track licence plates.

YRP will use their data and analysis to place these crime-fighting cameras in key locations where they are needed most to prevent crime.

The first six new cameras will be placed in the following locations:

- Highway 427 and Major Mackenzie Drive
- Highway 27 and Highway 7
- Weston Road and Rutherford Road
- Weston Road and Major Mackenzie Drive
- Keele Street and Highway 7
- Bathurst Street and Highway 7

The City is also investing in technology that will make it easier for YRP to detect when a gunshot has been fired.

It's all-hands-on deck as we work to make sure our residents feel safe.

City of Vaughan takes action to address coyote concerns

The City of Vaughan is taking proactive steps to address growing concerns about coyote activity in local neighbourhoods.

On Sept. 22, Vaughan Council approved a motion brought forward by Councillor Gila Martow to hire qualified, licensed trappers to capture and remove problem coyotes. This decision reflects Council's continued commitment to ensuring the safety and peace of mind of Vaughan residents.

Following this direction, the City has retained a qualified trapper, and work to address the issue has begun. The City remains focused on finding effective, responsible solutions to manage wildlife interactions and maintain community safety.

Residents who encounter coyotes or have concerns about their presence are encouraged to report sightings and interactions to Vaughan Animal Services:

City partners with Vaughan Soccer Club to bring a new soccer dome to North Maple Regional Park



The City celebrated another milestone in the development of NMRP with the groundbreaking of the new Vaughan Soccer Club dome that will be a destination for soccer enthusiasts for years to come.

On July 29, Mayor Steven Del Duca, Members of Council and members of the Vaughan Soccer Club held a special event at NMRP to mark the start of construction on this facility.

This project is a collaborative effort between the City and the Vaughan Soccer Club, which are partnering to design, build, operate and maintain the future soccer dome.

Located within NMRP, the soccer dome, which will be ready for play by the end of the year, will feature an 11 versus 11 artificial turf field and offer year-round indoor programming. This new, first-of-its-kind facility at NMRP supports the City's long-term vision to create

a nationally significant park that focuses on restoring nature, sharing culture, promoting active living and building community.

The development of NMRP is a key priority for Vaughan. The site has rich history, once serving as the third-largest landfill in North America. Vaughan CARES, a group of residents, played a key role in closing the landfill in 2002. Since then, the City has worked to transform the area into parkland guided by the principles of Restore, Engage and Play.

The City's action on panhandling

As part of the City of Vaughan's commitment to further enhance safety for pedestrians and motorists, the City's Nuisance By-law 124-2024 (PDF) was recently updated. It is now illegal to:

- loiter in a roadway, including on medians, and within a sight triangle.
- nuisance loiter and solicit, such as panhandle.
- use deceptive solicitation tactics, such as misrepresenting circumstances to solicit funds.

Enhancing road safety in Vaughan



Continuing to reduce speed limits is an integral part of the City's comprehensive Speed Limit Policy. Approved by

the policy sets and adjusts appropriate speed limits throughout the City's street network to continue to help ensure a safe community for all road users, including motorists, cyclists and pedestrians, and to address growing urbanization.

The Speed Limit Policy is exclusive to municipal roads and focuses on four areas within Vaughan's road network: urban areas (including school zones), rural roadways, public laneways and select neighbourhoods. Since 2022, this has expanded to several additional roads and neighbourhoods.

Enhancing Fire Station 7-1 to serve you better



The City is committed to keeping residents safe – and that includes making sure our fire stations are up to date and ready for emergency responders to jump into action.

Fire Station 7-1, located at 835 Clark Ave., was identified as needing a full-scale renewal to modernize, improve operational efficiency and support sustainability goals.



The total cost to revitalize Fire Station 7-1 is \$9 million, with \$7.9 million coming from the City, \$880,000 from the Government of Canada and \$220,000 from the Government of Ontario.

These improvements will reduce electricity demand, natural gas use and water consumption, while increasing the station's operational efficiency and expanding the facility's lifespan.

Vaughan Council, the Sherman family and the United Jewish Appeal (UJA) Federation of Greater Toronto gathered to rename Wood Valley Park to Honey and Barry Memorial Park (2 Marc Santi Blvd.). The Sherman family's \$5-million donation to the UJA funded significant park upgrades, including expanded play areas and more.

The new twin ice pad arena will host inclusive programs, ensuring the Sherman's legacy continues to live on.

Check for leaks!

Water leaks in your home are more common than you may think. Most leaks are silent, making them hard to spot, and they could be the cause of a higher-than-usual water and wastewater bill.

Follow these tips to help you detect a leak before it costs you.

Dye tablets to check for leaks, City of Vaughan

Check your water meter

To test for water leaks on your property, write down the number on your water meter before going to bed. Remember, the water meter is typically located in the basement. Then, avoid running sprinklers, appliances or toilets overnight.

In the morning, check the number on your water meter. If the number has changed, this indicates water has passed.

The City's Pavement Management Program

The City maintains a 1,200-kilometre network of community roads, which need maintenance to ensure safe and reliable travel for all road users. That's where the Pavement Management Program comes in – we work hard to repair, preserve and enhance roadway infrastructure.

To be considered for repair, the infrastructure, including roads and curbs, must meet a list of criteria, such as sidewalks with major cracks.

You'll receive mailed newsletters from the City if your street is selected for repairs.

To ensure Kirby Road remains safe and accessible, the City is reconstructing the slope – or steep hill – and culvert on this road just east of Highway 27.

Work is underway and is expected to wrap up by the end

of this year. To safely complete this work, a full road closure is required in the area of construction along Kirby Road, east of Highway 27.

Local traffic will have access to Kirby Road throughout construction.

All you need to know about gardening

The new Ask a Gardener series provides tips and tricks for maintaining and caring for your plants. Presented by the City's environmental stewardship and sustainability program, Green Guardians, these tips will help gardeners at all levels feel confident tending to their plants.

With the colder weather upon us, it's time to start thinking about your perennials! Perennials survive the winter and come back yearly, making them great seasonal fixtures for your garden. Here's how to take care of them year-round:

- Promote new blooms by removing dead flowers. This can help your plant conserve energy and focus on producing fresh growth.
- Occasionally divide perennials into smaller sections to keep them healthy and stimulate new growth.



Help your perennials survive the winter with these simple steps:

- Insulate your garden with a layer of mulch to protect plants from harsh elements.
- Mark your perennials to avoid any accidental damage in the off-season.
- For perennials in containers, move them to a cold but sheltered spot.
- Avoid fertilizing too close to winter.

Changes to the blue box recycling program

Did you know the Province of Ontario is moving responsibility for recycling collection away from municipalities? Starting Jan. 1, 2026, recycling will be operated by Circular Materials Ontario, a non-profit organization appointed by the Province. Although recycling in Vaughan will continue to be collected by Miller Waste Systems Inc., the City of Vaughan will no longer oversee blue box recycling collection or manage the purchase and replacement of City-branded blue boxes.

The City will continue to collect garbage, green bin organics, large and bulky items, and leaf and yard waste, including real Christmas trees. The City will no longer sell or exchange blue bins after Jan. 1, but you can continue to use your current bins.

Circular Materials Ontario is also expanding what can go in the blue box as of Jan. 1. New materials include:

- chip bags and food wrapping, including plastic and foil wrappers
- deodorant stick containers
- pet food bags
- stand-up reusable pouches
- Styrofoam™
- toothpaste tubes

Weekly leaf and yard waste collection is back!



Now that fall is here, you might have extra leaf and yard waste to get rid of. Weekly leaf and yard waste collection returns this week! **From now until the week of Dec. 2, leaf and yard waste will be collected every week.**

Here's what will be accepted on collection day:

- shrubs, branches, twigs and leaves
- flowers, plants and weeds
- seasonal décor, including pumpkins, straw and cornstalks
- vegetable garden waste

Before you bag your waste, here are a few reminders and tips to ensure your leaf and yard waste is always picked up on collection day:

- Make sure leaf and yard waste is always in Kraft paper bags or an open-top rigid container clearly marked "Leaf and yard waste."
- Keep leaf and yard waste dry! If rain is in the forecast overnight, keep your bags covered or in the garage until the morning. Wet or degraded bags will not be picked up on collection day.



Mayor Steven Del Duca's call to fix Canada's criminal justice system



Repeat criminals continue to invade homes and disrupt neighbourhoods. Criminals who show no regard for human life or property must face real consequences. They must be behind bars, not out on bail and back on Vaughan's streets.

Federal leaders must fix the broken criminal justice system once and for all. Cities can invest in police, communities can rally together, but Ottawa must fix the core problem. The public needs all hands on deck and all levels of government to work together and fix this issue now.

I continue to urge the Federal government to take decisive action, including tougher bail laws for repeat violent offenders and a justice system that puts communities first.

Ending speed cameras in Vaughan



The City of Vaughan has officially ended its speed camera program on local roads.

We listened — and you told us:

- Focus on real criminals
- Give families a break during affordability challenges
- You want leaders who have your back

In June 2025, Council paused the program, and by September, we voted to end it immediately. I then joined Premier Ford as he announced the Province would eliminate municipal speed cameras across Ontario.

That legislation has now passed — and as of Nov. 14, 2025, speed cameras will no longer be allowed to operate anywhere in the province.

To be clear, York Region's program remains active on major roads like Weston, Islington, Major Mackenzie and Rutherford until the law takes full effect on Nov. 14th, 2025.

But here in Vaughan — our speed cameras are gone.

Major expansions coming to NMRP!



Vaughan's North Maple Regional Park is rapidly evolving! Mayor Steven Del Duca was proud to recently announce exciting new features that will make the park a go-to destination.

We broke ground on the Family Recreation Area – a \$26-million investment! The new space will include nature playgrounds, water play areas, a winter skate trail and more.

In partnership with the Vaughan Soccer Club, we are building an indoor soccer dome, allowing for year-round activities and competitive play! Construction on the dome is underway and will be complete in the fall of 2025. This indoor facility will feature a full-size 11 versus 11 artificial turf field.

Yonge North Subway Extension: A key step in keeping Vaughan moving!

Through the motion, the City has made updates to the Nuisance By-law giving staff stronger enforcement powers — including the ability to issue penalties immediately on major roads like Weston Road, Islington Avenue and Rutherford Road.

These changes help protect public safety, uphold community standards and ensure Vaughan remains a safe and supportive place for all.

Canada Drive-America Avenue bridge

The City of Vaughan is making exciting progress on the new bridge over Highway 400, which will connect Canada Drive and America Avenue. This project, aligned with Mayor Del Duca's Nine-Point Action Plan, is key to reducing traffic congestion, fighting gridlock and improving connectivity between communities.

This summer, the concrete was poured on the bridge deck — marking another major milestone toward completion. We remain on track to finish this vital project by the end of 2026.

An important update on speed cameras



On Sept. 15, Vaughan City Council showed leadership by voting to end the City's speed camera program. Shortly after, on Sept. 25, Premier Doug Ford announced that speed cameras will be scrapped across Ontario.

The Province of Ontario has since passed legislation to ban speed cameras and as of Nov. 14, 2025, they will no longer be allowed to operate.

York Region's speed cameras will cease to operate as of Nov 14, 2025. These cameras were installed on the following roads:

- Bathurst Street, north of New Westminster Drive/Atkinson Avenue
- Islington Avenue, south of Rutherford Road
- Keele Street, north of Dina Road
- Major Mackenzie Drive West, west of Lawford Road
- Rutherford Road, east of Islington Avenue
- Weston Road, north of Ashberry Boulevard
- Yonge Street, south of Arnold Avenue

In the meantime, the Province has committed to supporting municipalities with other traffic-calming measures that improve road safety without burdening residents.

Road safety will always be a top priority in Vaughan. We will continue protecting vulnerable road users while focusing our efforts on fighting real crime.

Be aware of illegal signs and unlicensed businesses operating in Vaughan

The City of Vaughan's Sign By-law 140-2018 (PDF) helps keep neighbourhoods safe and attractive by regulating the placement, size and type of signs allowed in the city.

Signs must follow the by-law, and may require a City-issued permit. Use caution when contacting companies that advertise illegally by posting stickers or posters on public property. These companies are often not licensed.

Even if a business or contractor is licensed by the City, do your own research to ensure they are qualified for the job.




