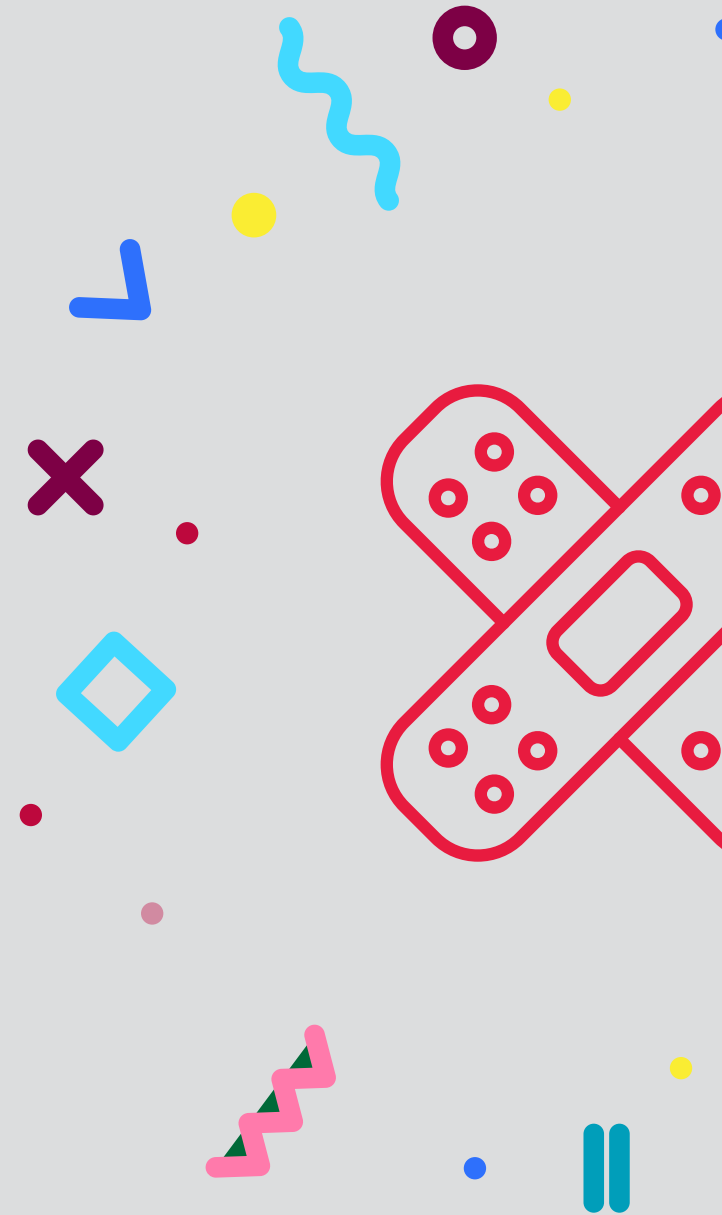
There are no laws in Ontario to protect first aiders from liability for damages allegedly caused by their voluntary first aid treatment outside the scope of their employment.



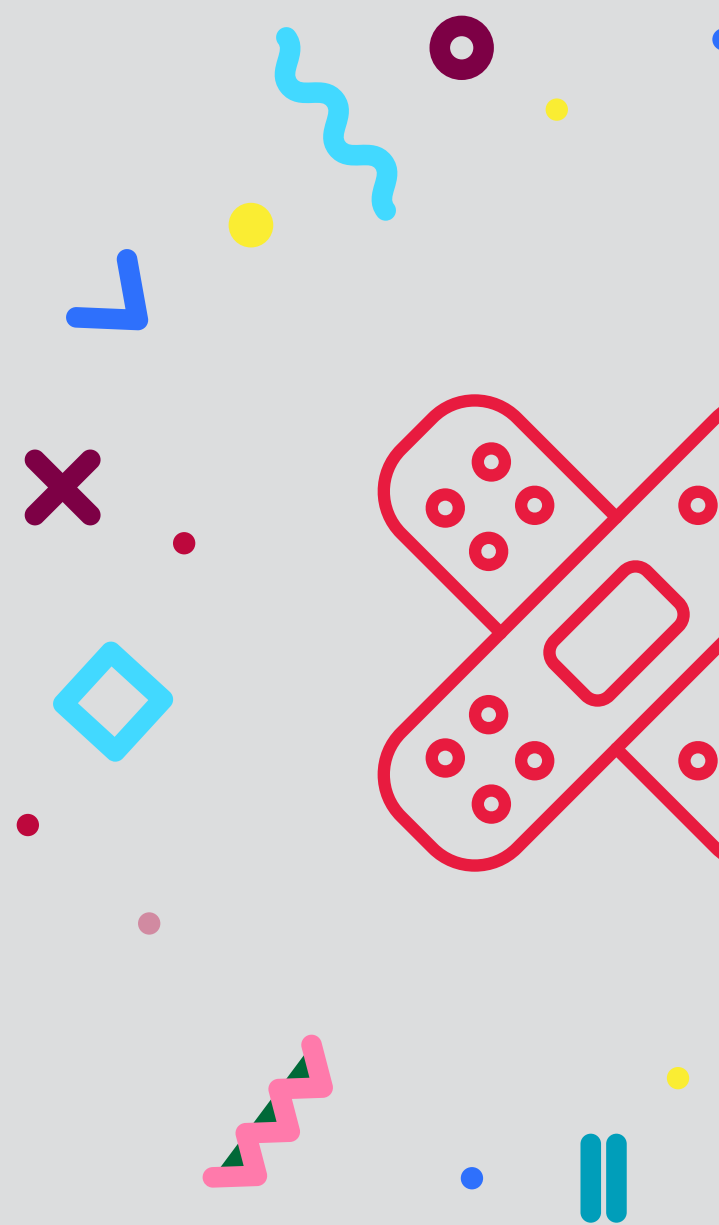
You can stop first aid when another qualified person takes over.



If a person is unconscious, you should not treat them because you don't have their consent.

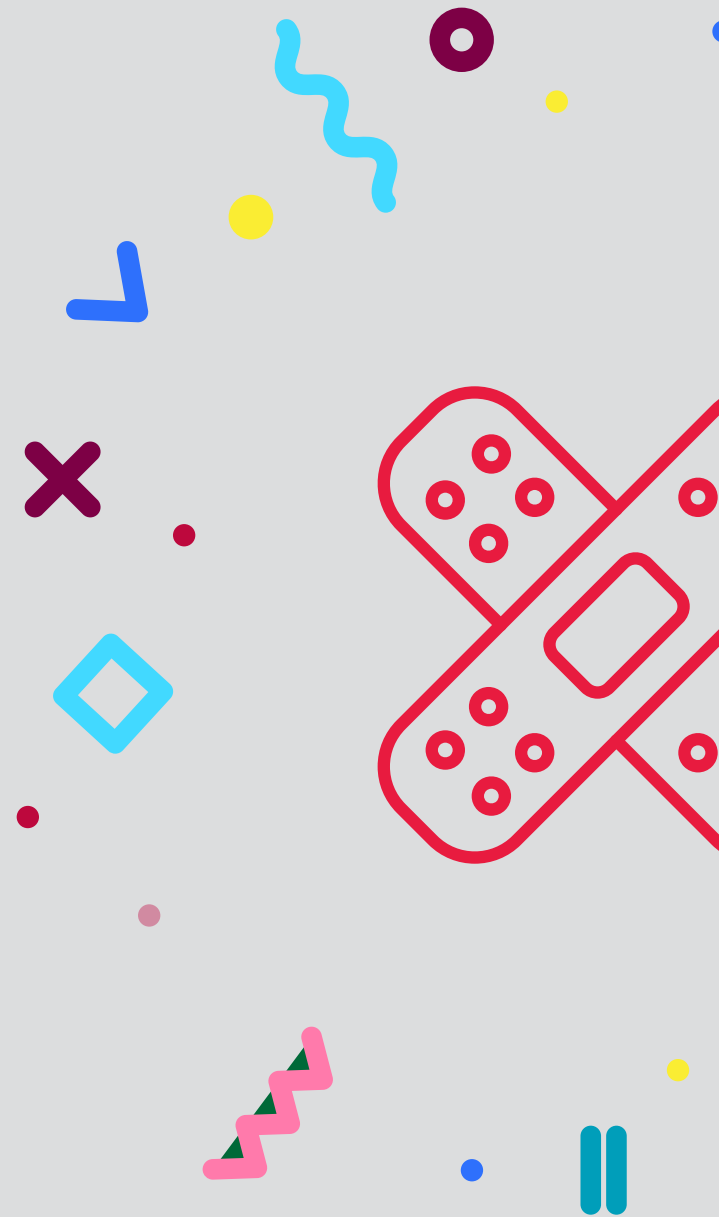


If a parent/guardian/caregiver is present, you don't need permission to treat a child/infant because they don't know anything about first aid.

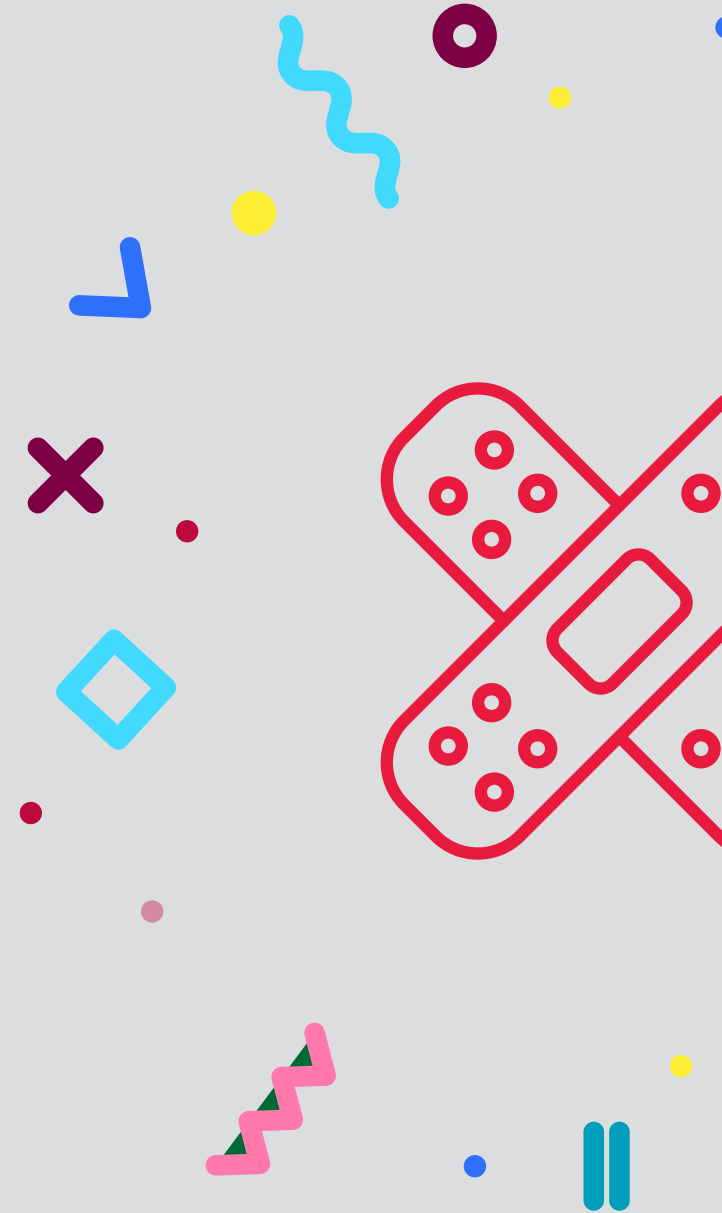


You don't always need to ask for permission before beginning first aid treatment on a conscious adult.

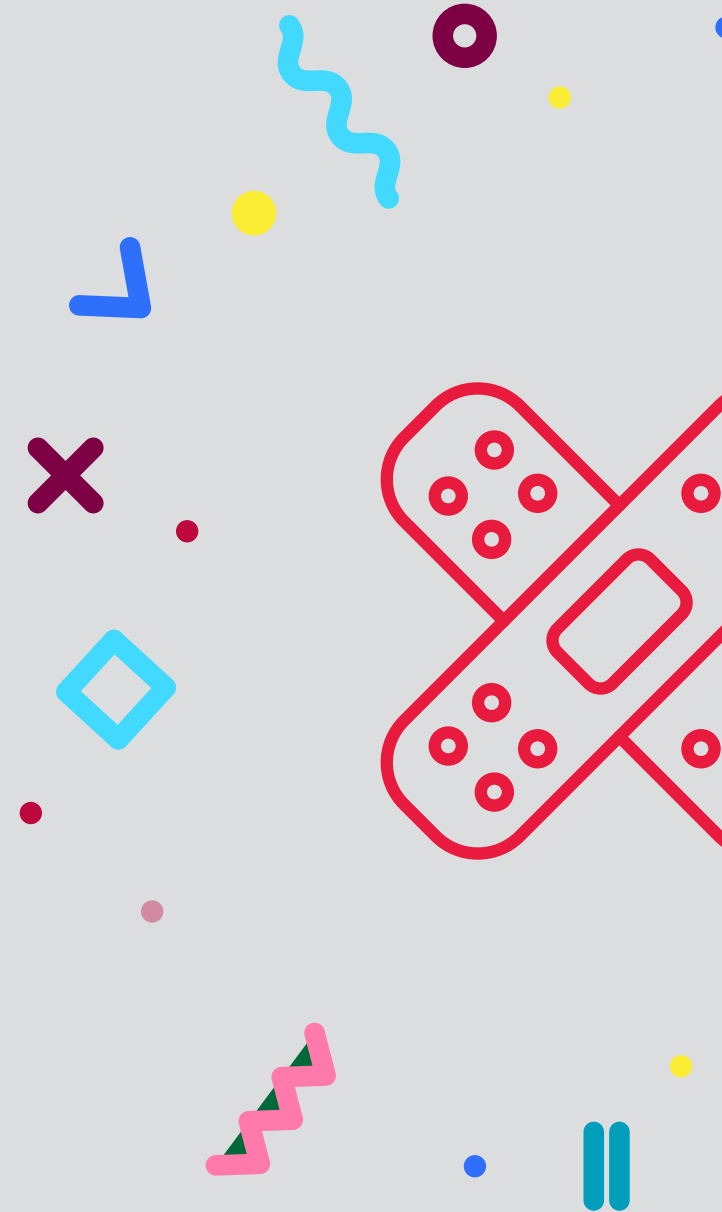

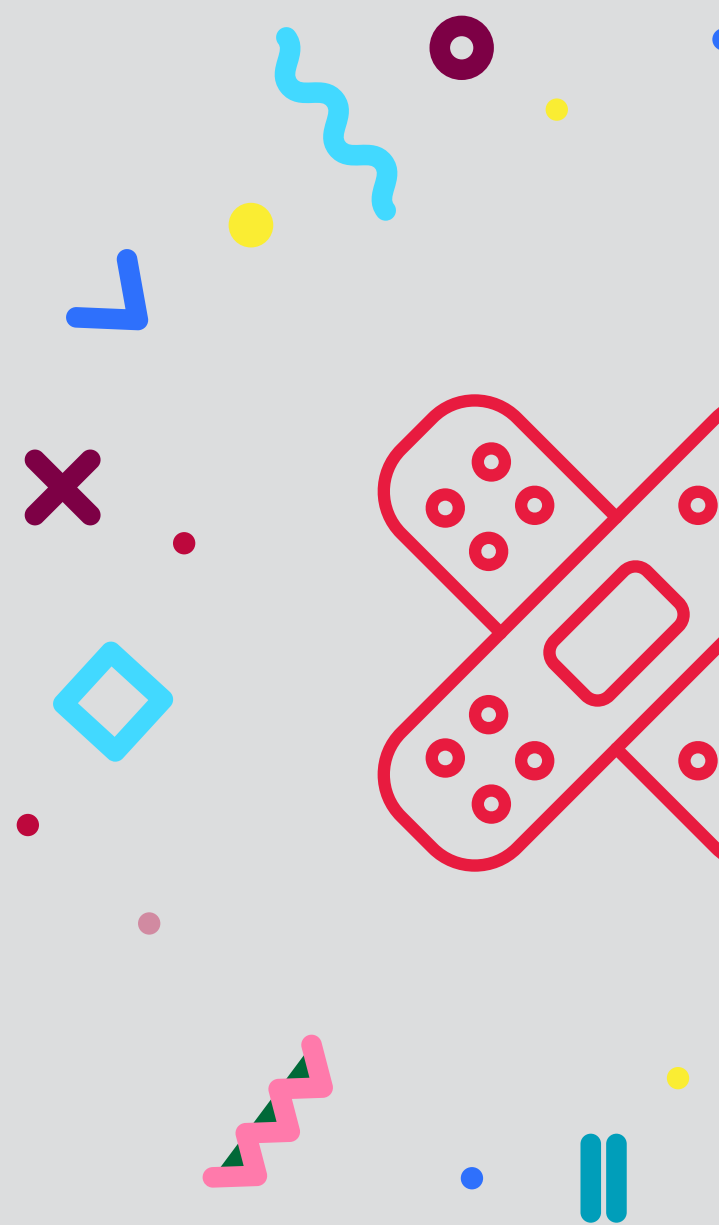
You can stop first aid if you are too exhausted to continue.



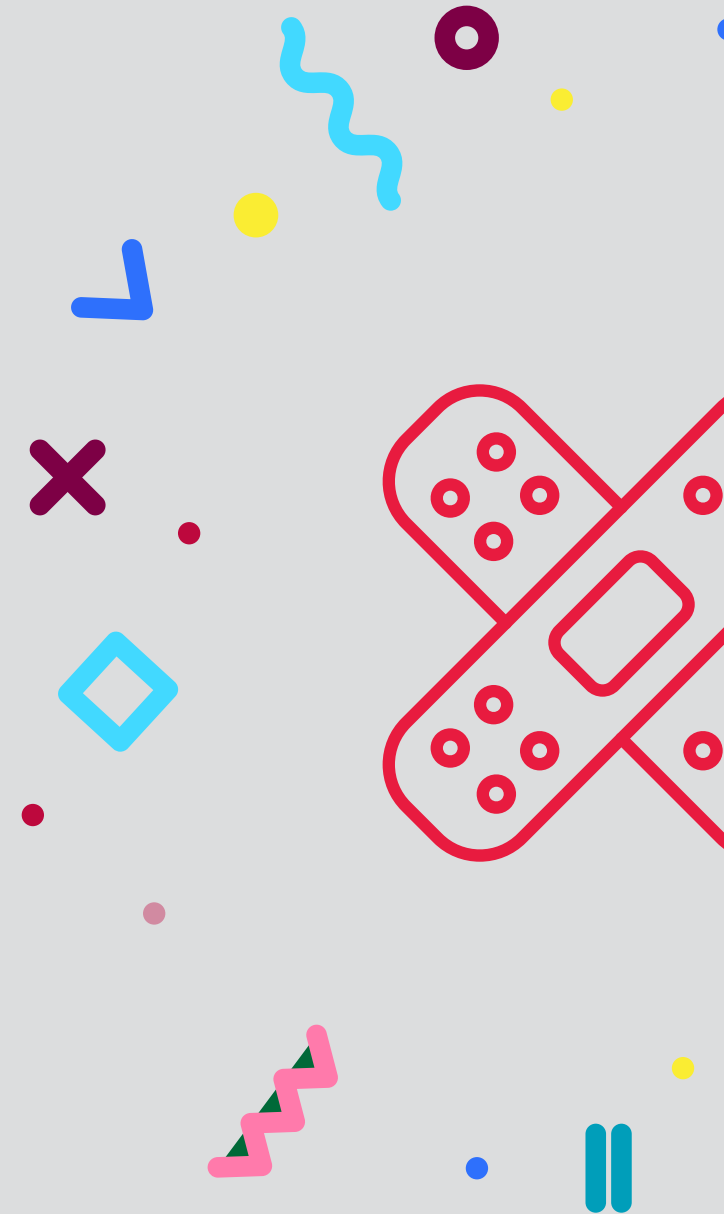
You can stop first aid if you are at personal risk/in danger.
