

# About the Project




## **Yonge-Steeles Corridor Secondary Plan**


- The purpose of the Yonge-Steeles
   Corridor Secondary Plan is to guide the intensification and redevelopment of the corridor anticipated as a result of the planned subway extension.
- A Secondary Plan is a land use plan for a particular area of a municipality which provides more detailed policies for the area it covers, such as public spaces, parks and urban design.
- The Plan was originally approved in 2010 but appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT).



# **Yonge-Steeles Corridor Secondary Plan**

- An amended Secondary Plan was approved by Council in March 2022.
- An OLT settlement was reached in August 2022 bringing the majority of the Secondary Plan into effect.
- Changes to the Secondary Plan are focused in the southern area and include revised heights, density, road network and parks.
- New urban design policies are the starting point for the urban design guidelines.







# **Scope of the Study**

The Yonge Steeles Corridor Urban Design Study and Streetscape Plan consists of three components:

- The development of a design framework and urban design guidelines for built form and public realm
- 2. A detailed streetscape plan
- 3. An implementation and phasing strategy including operations and maintenance costing

# Vision & Guiding Principles

#### **Vision Statement**

The Yonge-Steeles Corridor will accommodate high quality and sustainable transit-supportive intensification within an exceptional public realm that supports the daily experience of residents, employees and visitors.

# **Guiding Principles**







#### **Design Excellence**

As a signature location within the City of Vaughan, the Yonge-Steeles Corridor will demonstrate design excellence both in its built form and public realm and will lead the city with complete streets and streetscaping that enhance the district identity and user experience.



The Yonge-Steeles Corridor will include a variety of high quality public and private open spaces that serve the needs of its diverse population.

#### Connectivity

The Yonge-Steeles Corridor will provide seamless connections by transit, walking and cycling to surrounding areas in the City of Vaughan and neighbouring municipalities.

#### Safety and Accessibility

The Yonge-Steeles Corridor will provide a safe and accessible environment that encourages people to choose to walk, cycle and take transit and gives opportunity for pause and rest.







#### Sustainability

The Yonge-Steeles Corridor will incorporate sustainability best practices in its buildings, streetscapes and open spaces, and will prioritize parks and green space to serve the population.

#### Compatibility

New development in the Yonge-Steeles Corridor will be designed to integrate into the existing and planned context and provide appropriate transitions to local sites, surrounding neighbourhoods and natural settings.

#### **Flexibility**

Planning for the Yonge-Steeles Corridor will anticipate future opportunities for transit-oriented development at station areas.

#### Collaboration

The City of Vaughan will work closely with its public sector partners and with private sector developers to implement the vision for the Yonge-Steeles Corridor.


# Urban Design Framework

#### **Transit**

- Yonge North Subway Extension includes three new stations within the study area
  - Steeles Avenue Station
  - Clarke Avenue Station
  - Royal Orchard Station
- Future BRT is proposed along Steeles Ave W
- The majority of the study area will be within 800m of a subway station

#### Data Sources

Street network: Secondary Plan



#### **Road Network**

- Existing large blocks in the South Area have been broken down with a **new street network** to create a walkable neighbourhood
- Yonge St and Steeles Ave will support the transit activities along the corridors
- Royal Palm has been extended to Yonge St and will act as a green spine through the study area
- Introduction of 14m woonerf between the continuous series of east-west parks and development



# **Cycling Network**

- Existing dedicated bike lanes along Clarke Avenue
- Bike lanes proposed on Yonge Street as part of York Region's South Yonge Street Master Plan
- New local roads planned in the Secondary Plan area will have protected bike lanes, some of which connect to bike lanes proposed in the City of Toronto's Yonge Street North Secondary Plan



# **Land Use and Density**

- The South Area has predominantly High-Rise Mixed-Use designations along Yonge St and Steeles Avenue
- The North Area has predominantly Mid-Rise & Low-Rise Mixed-Use designations
- Mandatory retail frontage on Steeles Ave West and Yonge Street in South Area


