There's 'snow' place like home, but when you do need to leave the house this winter, you can do so with peace of mind knowing our crews are working around the clock to keep our city moving.



From preventing ice and snow from building up on roads or clearing it from paths, sidewalks and windrows, your safety is our top priority. With more than 230 pieces of snow-removal equipment to service more than 2,200 lane-kilometres of roads, 1,200 kilometres of sidewalks and park pathways, and 63 City-owned facilities, we're ready to take on whatever Mother Nature brings us this season.

As we plow ahead, look out for BLIZZARD OF OZ and friends!

After reviewing hundreds of submissions for our Name the Plow contest, and thanks to your votes, the results are in! We've officially named 10 of our snowplows for the 2023/24 winter season! While you might be excited to see CTRL-SALT-DELETE and VAUGHAN-ILLA ICE out clearing your street, please remember to keep a safe distance from our plows and salting equipment – it's for your safety and the safety of our operators.

Here are some simple ways you can help ensure our winter operations run smoothly:

• Don't park cars on the street while snowplows are out clearing the roads.

Did you know the City of Vaughan continues to maintain one of the lowest tax rates in the Greater Toronto Area? It's true! The City is focused on keeping property tax rates low, respecting taxpayers' hard-earned money and delivering more than 200 quality programs and services that residents, businesses and visitors rely on each day.

The budget is made up of two parts:

- Operating Budget spent on running City facilities, programs and services
- Capital Budget spent on projects that include building City infrastructure and keeping it in a state of good repair, such as roads and buildings

Although less than 30 per cent of property taxes go to the City, our innovative and resident-centred budget is dedicated to investing in the community's future, embracing sustainable growth and delivering on the City's mission of Citizens First Through Service Excellence. The rest of your property taxes are directed to York Region for regional services like public health and policing, and the Province of Ontario for education.

We started 2023 by hosting the City's Lunar New Year celebration, followed by the inaugural Mayor and Council New Year's Levee, and that was just the beginning!



As an equal-opportunity employer and forward-thinking municipality, we are continually working to champion a more inclusive community. In fact, creating Active, Engaged and Inclusive Communities is one of the strategic priorities in the 2022-2026 Term of Council Service Excellence Strategic Plan.

We have a long-standing commitment to fostering a community culture that is diverse, inclusive and equitable, where all residents, employees, businesses and visitors have accessible opportunities to engage and participate. Guiding our actions is the City's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Strategy and Multi-Year Action Plan.

This plan outlines our dedication to strengthening corporate diversity and inclusion efforts. It aims to identify and address systemic discrimination and inequities in access to municipal services, community participation and civic engagement.

- The **rainbow crosswalk** in front of City Hall is a powerful symbol of our goal to advance inclusivity and acceptance of everyone that lives in or visits our city.
- Eight students completed **Project SEARCH**, a year-long transition-to-work program for high school students with developmental or intellectual impairments.

And our efforts are being noticed! Recently, we won a 2022 Canadian HR Award in the Excellence in Diversity and Inclusion category, which recognizes an organization with diversity and inclusion at the heart of its business. Being presented with this award reflects the innovative and leading best practices we employ to foster a dynamic and welcoming workplace. Keep catch basins and fire hydrants clear of snow and ice

The resident living closest to a catch basin is encouraged to help clear it of snow, ice and other debris, if it's safe to do so, to help prevent flooding. Ensure snow and ice are not blocking the area surrounding a hydrant and a clear path from the street to the hydrant is always maintained.


Keep waste off snowbanks and roads

Place waste on the curb on the right-hand side of the driveway (when facing the home) where possible. Do not put bins or bags on the road. Waste bins or bags buried in snow, frozen to the ground, on top of or behind snowbanks will not be collected.

Check out the new and improved Woodbridge Avenue!

The Woodbridge Avenue Improvements and Streetscaping project is now complete! The newly enhanced Woodbridge Avenue promotes walking and transit use, provides a safe space for pedestrians away from vehicles, supports daily community life and events, captures inspirational, educational and heritage elements, increases tree coverage and more. Municipal infrastructure improvements made to the area include road rehabilitation, watermain replacements, sanitary sewer upgrades, streetscape and landscape enhancements, streetlighting improvements and traffic signal additions, among others. The City undertook this project to beautify the area, honour its history and complete key infrastructure



improvements to serve current and future residents and businesses in Woodbridge Village for years to come.

With help from the Government of Canada, through the Federal Economic Development

Agency for Southern Ontario, the City received more than \$2 million to help complete five city-building projects in Vaughan. This includes streetscaping along Woodbridge Avenue and improving infrastructure between Islington Avenue and Kipling Avenue.

Working to enhance Kleinburg Village



Kleinburg Village is a picturesque and historic area located within Ward 1. Supported by the Kleinburg Business Improvement Association, it is home to more than 60 retail and service businesses, as well as schools, libraries, parks, art galleries and residences.

Starting in spring 2024, the City will be making improvements to this area, including adding new parking spaces, cycling facilities, streetscaping and landscape features, watermains, road rehabilitation and more. All of this work is part of the Kleinburg Village Improvements project, which the City is undertaking to address the significant growth this corridor has seen over the last decade and ensure municipal infrastructure continues to support the community for years to come. The project area extends along Islington Avenue, from Major Mackenzie Drive to Highway 27, along Nashville Road, from Highway 27 to

Islington Avenue, and along Stegman's Mill Road from Islington Avenue to Teston Road. Work is anticipated to be complete by summer 2026.

Kleinburg Village will remain open for business throughout the duration of the project. You're encouraged to continue to support local stores, restaurants and organizations during construction. Alternate temporary parking will be made available in the area (just north of the Village) when the work begins.

- Run a photoshoot in the Photography & Video Studio.

- Write computer code and program robots
- Build electric circuits and control them with micro computers.
- Explore digital worlds in Virtual Reality.
- Build models and structures with engineering sets.
- Edit a video, build a website or create digital art.

This includes everything from delivering small business and entrepreneurship support services through the Vaughan Business and Entrepreneurship Centre (VBEC) to developing the city's economic assets – resources of value that can offer benefits, financial or otherwise, to the community, such as the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct – and strengthening the city's tourism-related sector through the Vaughan Destination Master Plan.

How is this done? The team creates relationships, builds networks and generates resources to meet the needs of Vaughan's local businesses.

Business advisory services

We offer advice to entrepreneurs and businesses of all stages and sizes. Whether you're mulling your first business idea or looking for solutions to complicated business challenges, we're here to help with services ranging from research and business intelligence support to connections to funding sources, financing and grants.

Want to talk to a representative? The team offers one-on-one consultation services by appointment via tele- or video-conferencing as well as in-person. Small business assistance is available for in person drop-in services at Vaughan City Hall (2141 Major Mackenzie Dr.) from Monday to Friday between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., excluding holidays. Medium and large enterprises can reach out directly to the team member that best represents their industry or location in Vaughan.

Expanding or relocating to Vaughan

Our team can help you expand or relocate your business in Vaughan by supporting your real estate search, connecting you to the right people, sharing information about the community and advising on other opportunities and challenges.

Finding partnership opportunities

We can help you find strategic partners and partnership opportunities to grow your business in Vaughan. We facilitate networking through events, entrepreneurship programming and our online networking platform, the Vaughan Business Café. You can ask for tailored suggestions by contacting us or signing up for a complimentary one-hour consultation with our team.

The City also offers a variety of partnership and sponsorship opportunities through the Corporate Partnerships program. From purchasing the naming rights to a City facility to program partnerships and infrastructure support, we can help customize a business-to-business or business-to-consumer opportunity that meets your business objectives and allows you to give back by directly investing in the community.

Small business and entrepreneurship assistance

Our department offers support for local businesses and entrepreneurs at all stages. The VBEC provides one-stop services for Vaughan's aspiring entrepreneurs and existing business owners, with access to business information, resources, training and hands-on assistance to start or grow a business in Vaughan. We can also help innovators take new ideas from concept to market by offering local commercialization support and access to a robust innovation ecosystem. Programs like Summer Company and Starter Company Plus are great for getting started.

Tourism organization support

Our team is working to develop Vaughan's tourism sector. The Council-approved Vaughan Destination Master Plan lays out a comprehensive plan for developing Vaughan's tourism-related industry cluster. It does this through governance and City policy framework, product development, partnerships, marketing and communications, and research and data analysis.

Our initiatives support Vaughan-based tourism organizations and businesses by offering extended reach to visitors through marketing opportunities, a better understanding of visitors to Vaughan through reports and insights, and a strong network of peers and industry leaders through networking opportunities.

Strategic initiative development



Participating in Council meetings

As one of the fastest growing cities in Canada, Vaughan is constantly evolving. But new buildings don't just pop up overnight – all development applications undergo a careful review by City staff, Vaughan Council and public agencies, where appropriate.

Did you know you can also have a say?

Your opinion matters and is an important part of the planning and city-building process.

If you're looking to get involved in a public meeting and/or provide input on a specific item on the agenda, here's how:

- Speak live during the Public Meeting either in person, or via teleconference/telephone. To pre-register to speak, you must complete the Request to Speak form available at vaughan.ca/CouncilMeetings, or call Service Vaughan at 905-832-2281.
- Submit a written communication as part of an agenda item. All written communications can be emailed to the Office of the City Clerk at clerks@vaughan.ca.
- Contact the City planner on file directly by phone, email or letter. Contact details can be found on the public meeting notice sent by mail, or you can reach out to Service Vaughan at 905-832-2281 or service@vaughan.ca.



How are Public Meetings promoted to the public?

The City issues a public notice for all development applications in accordance with statutory requirements outlined in the Ontario Planning Act. Typically, the public notice is issued a minimum of 20 days before the meeting to all residents living within 150 metres of the subject land. You can view the full schedule of upcoming meetings and agendas at vaughan.ca/CouncilMeetings

What happens at a Public Meeting?

Landowners present their application, including plans, at the public meeting. Councillors may comment or ask questions and members of the public have an opportunity to share their opinion if they have pre-registered to speak. The purpose of this meeting is to inform and gather feedback from Council and the community – no decision is made at this time.
