Taking strong action on unauthorized

car rallies

One of the many steps the City of Vaughan has taken to prioritize public safety is to prohibit any participation in unauthorized car rallies – which typically involve people gathering with modified vehicles to do stunts.

They can involve taking over private property, like parking lots, or roads. These events do not have a permit or permission from the City to take place. Unauthorized car rallies are disruptive • sponsoring, collecting money for, to the quality of life in Vaughan and pose a significant risk to community safety. They often come with excessive noise, speeding, stunt driving and blocking or impeding motor or pedestrian traffic.

In March 2024, Vaughan Council approved changes to the City's Special Events By-law and Noise By-law to address this serious concern!



The Special Events By-law 047-2024 now prohibits any participation in unauthorized car rallies, including:

- co-ordinating, advertising or hosting an unauthorized car rally.
- spectating, attending or bringing a vehicle to an unauthorized car rally.
- driving or riding as a passenger in a motor vehicle at an unauthorized car rally.
- stopping, slowing or impeding the movement of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, as a consequence of an unauthorized car rally.
- being a vendor at an unauthorized car rally.

The Noise By-law 046-2024 prohibits anyone from emitting, causing or permitting noise from an unauthorized car rally.

Fines

The City and York Regional Police (YRP) are enforcing these by-law amendments. The maximum fine for participating in an unauthorized car rally is \$10,000 and the maximum fine for breaking the Noise By-law is \$5,000.



Promoting safe and healthy communities

Public safety is a leading priority for the City of Vaughan. We are committed to fostering a high quality of life through comprehensive initiatives, by-laws and fire protection services that promote safe and healthy communities.

Many steps are being taken to ensure our community continues to be a safe place for everyone who lives, works and visits here:

• In 2023, Mayor Steven Del Duca wrote to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and the Minister of Public Safety calling for all levels of government to work together to ensure dangerous offenders are kept off the streets and to address the rise in auto thefts in Vaughan and York Region.



• The City held a series of public meetings last year on community safety to provide updates and hear about the issues that matter to you.

- To help fight auto theft, Vaughan residents can pick up a free key fob protective bag at any Vaughan community centre or the City Hall welcome desk.
- Ongoing partnerships with YRP are advancing community safety initiatives. For information and resources, visit **<u>yrp.ca</u>**.
- In March, Vaughan Council approved by-law amendments prohibiting unauthorized car rallies.

Mayor Del Duca welcomes approval and funding for **York University's School** of Medicine in Vaughan





On March 20, Mayor Steven Del Duca delivered his keynote address during the Annual Mayor's Luncheon presented by the Vaughan Chambe of Commerce and plans to build a performing and cultural arts centre took centre stage. Mayor Del Duca outlined a plan for the City of Vaughan to develop a performing and cultural arts centre within the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre (VMC).

On March 26, Mayor Steven Del Duca joined Premier Doug Ford as he announced approval and funding for York University's School of Medicine as part of the Ontario Government's 2024 Budget. This critical infrastructure will have far-reaching impacts on future students and patients. When built, this new medical school will play a vital role in delivering more family doctors for communities like Vaughan. It is another important step forward on the

City's journey toward becoming a leading destination for healthcare excellence.

The School of Medicine is foundational to one of the City's most ambitious projects, the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct (VHCP). Together, the City, York University, Mackenzie Health and ventureLAB are building the VHCP into a magnet for excellence in health research, education, commercialization and more.

Championing the arts and creative industries

In addition, Mayor Del Duca announced key initiatives the City is undertaking to position Vaughan as a leading destination and creative hub for residents, visitors, artists, entrepreneurs and industry leaders, including:

- Introducing the Host in Vaughan Grant program, a new fund to enhance tourism across the city.
- Advancing a new Creative Arts and **Cultural Industries Advisory Committee** of Council.
- Expanding the **ARTonBOXES** program to animate public spaces with more than 100 new public art installations.
- Building on the City's Memorandum of Understanding with the **McMichael** Canadian Art Collection and the Vaughan International Film Festival to advance the city's arts, culture and creative industries.
- Developing plans for a **cultural arts district** in the VMC.

Kirby Road is being extended!



To improve transportation and mobility, reduce gridlock and help you travel more seamlessly throughout the community, we are extending Kirby Road between Dufferin Street and Bathurst Street.

The City hired KAPP Infrastructure Inc. to undertake the detailed design and construction of the road extension. The project is expected to break ground in late 2024 and is anticipated to be complete by summer 2026. The newly extended Kirby Road will feature:

- four lanes (two in each direction).
- a new bridge structure crossing East Patterson Creek.
- connections to a future underpass trail crossing at East Patterson Creek.
- an in-boulevard multi-use pathway for cyclists and pedestrians.
- drainage improvements.
- enhanced roadway lighting
- intersection improvements at both Dufferin Street and Bathurst Street.
- updated traffic signals.

This extension will complete the missing link between east Vaughan to west Richmond Hill and make it easier to get across the city. It will also shorten travel times and provide additional pedestrian options for everyone living and working in the area.

Make your spring clean 'green'!



The sun is out and the birds are chirping, which means you may be starting to spring clean in and around your home. To help you prepare for a fresh start, check out our top waste disposal tips and reminders:

- Leaf and yard waste: Vaughan's leaf and **vard waste collection** is back and started the week of April 16! The City will pick up yard waste materials every week on your regular collection day – please ensure they are placed at the curb no later than 7 a.m.
- How to pay your taxes
- There are many easy and cashless ways to pay your property taxes in Vaughan:
- Pre-authorized payment plans, including a six-instalment and a 10-instalment option.
- Post-dated cheques made payable to the City of Vaughan that correspond with the amounts and due dates printed on the tax stubs.



Water, wastewater and stormwater systems around the home

Did you know three different water systems run in and around your home? Vaughan's water, wastewater and stormwater systems work together to ensure safe and reliable drinking water comes out of your taps, wastewater exits when you flush a toilet and stormwater drains from your property when it rains.

- Catch basins: While raking leaves, check if the catch basin closest to your home needs clearing. Catch basins blocked or covered by leaves and other debris can lead to water ponding and flooding on the road.
- Organics: Turn your fruit and vegetable scraps into garden fertilizer by starting **backyard composting**. You can purchase a backyard composter through Service Vaughan.
- Large and bulky items: The City picks up large and bulky items curbside, and each piece counts as one item toward the three-item garbage limit. The items must be kept dry and cannot exceed 68 kilograms (150 pounds) to reduce the weight for collection crews. Items must be free of all sharp and hazardous objects, such as nails To check if an item is collected curbside, visit vaughan.ca/waste.
- **Clothing**: Donate old, gently used and unwanted clothing to a textile donation bin
- Household hazardous waste: Dispose of household hazardous waste, such as batteries, pool chemicals and paint, at a York Region waste depot. These items should never be placed in the garbage or poured down a drain.

• Curbside Giveaway Days: This city-wide waste reduction program is coming back soon! Reduce, reuse and recycle your gently used household items by placing them at the curb of your property for your neighbours to take for free. Participate in the first weekend on Saturday, May 25 and Sunday, May 26.

Not sure where a waste item belongs? You can check using the City's online 'What Goes Where?' sorting tool. You can also download the free Recycle Coach app from the **Apple** App Store or Google Play to learn what items go in what bin. The app provides waste-less tips and a personalized collection schedule with optional alerts on what to put to the curb each week



It's getting warmer outside, and the City's dedicated Public Works crews have begun their annual spring maintenance and cleanup efforts around the community. They are working hard to keep Vaughan's public spaces safe and beautiful.

Here are some of the services you'll start to see ramping up over the next few weeks:

Weekly leaf and yard waste collection is on now!



Vaughan is home to many wild animals including coyotes, raccoons, foxes and squirrels. As the weather gets warmer, it is normal to see them around the community. Keep these simple tips in mind so you and your family can live peacefully with urban wildlife.

Coyotes

If you encounter a coyote, keep your distance and keep pets on a short leash. If the coyote approaches you directly:

- if necessary.
- above your head.
- popped open and closed.

Never feed wildlife

Directly or unintentionally feeding wild animals (like leaving food in parks or birdfeeders) will

Keeping Vaughan clean, safe and beautiful this spring



It's time to get raking! The City is picking up leaf and yard waste materials every week on your scheduled collection day. Biweekly collection begins the week of **June 11**.

- Catch basins in residential areas are cleaned on a three-year rotation. This process involves using a vacuum truck to remove accumulated sediment and debris. This service takes place from April to May.
- Grass cutting begins in May and continues until October, for a total of 13 rotations on a bi-weekly basis.
- Mechanical litter collection earlier this month, our crews resumed using Madvac, an innovative vacuum that targets hard-to-reach areas – to collect litter from Vaughan's parks, open spaces, paths and trails. This service runs until November.
- Stormwater management ponds undergo grass cutting and litter collection, for a total of three rotations, from May to October.

Dandelion season is around the corner

Dandelions typically bloom in May and June. While they are not harmful to your pets, lawn or garden, they can be an eyesore. Crews regularly cut the grass on City property to keep dandelions at a minimum. Even with regular cuts, areas may appear unkempt as weeds grow faster than grass.

Street sweeping began earlier this month and runs until November.

- Traffic services staff will begin refreshing pavement markings and installing flexi-posts in May. They then remove the flexi-posts in November to accommodate the City's extensive winter maintenance program.
- Fire hydrants are inspected annually, and repainted yellow every five years. Inspections begin in April and end in November.

All spring operations are subject to weather conditions.

Stormwater ponds in Vaughan

Vaughan has more than 150 stormwater ponds, which collect rainfall and other runoff. They are built to reduce flooding, protect the environment from contaminants and erosion, create a habitat for wildlife and more. But they are not made for play! Please keep a safe distance away.

Living with wildlife

• stop: pick up children and small pets,

• stand your ground: never run from a coyote, fox or domestic dog. • make yourself big: wave your hands

• **be loud and assertive**: shout, stomp your feet and clap your hands.

• use a noisemaker: it could be your voice, pots and pans banged together, a shaker can (such as a pop can filled with pebbles), a plastic bag snapped around or an umbrella

• **slowly back away**: be assertive as you leave so the animal knows it is not welcome.

increase their tolerance to people and pets – and is also subject to a \$500 fine!

Be a responsible pet owner

Always keep dogs on leashes when outdoors if you're not in a safe, enclosed backyard. And keep cats indoors or in a secure outdoor enclosure. Free-roaming pets are vulnerable to a multitude of dangers. Almost all conflicts between wildlife and dogs occur when they are off-leash.

Do not invite unwanted houseguests

Keep your home properly sealed so wildlife stays where it belongs – outdoors. Remove attractants by picking up dog feces, cleaning outdoor grills and securing recycling and compost bins. Put waste out the morning of your collection day, rather than leaving it on the street overnight. Collect and store bins and any uncollected garbage on the same day.

Our new grant program supports events that draw tourists here



Did you know the tourism sector creates one in 15 jobs nationwide and infuses more than \$100 billion into the Canadian economy? Tourism is a cornerstone of Vaughan's economic prosperity, which is why our Tourism Vaughan team has launched the Host in Vaughan Grant - a new fund to enhance tourism across the city!

This grant aims to boost tourism in Vaughan by encouraging visits and participation at local events, as well as by establishing strong partnerships between stakeholders in the Vaughan tourism sector.

This program was recently announced by Mayor Steven Del Duca as part of the City's ongoing efforts to highlight the arts and creative industries. Applications for the first intake period are being accepted now until Wednesday, May 15.

The Host in Vaughan Grant will help grow existing events and projects in Vaughan and attract new ones to the city. Funding is available for sports events, business conferences, tourism partnerships, major festivals and events, and community activations.

If you've been considering starting a new business or looking for ways to expand your existing venture in Vaughan, you don't want to miss out on the City of Vaughan's Starter **Company Plus** program! The next application period is now open until Monday, June 10.

Through this program, the City offers tailored training for various business types, including brick-and-mortar, food and beverage, new startup and home-based, and technology

ventures to develop a business plan, marketing strategy, budget and financial forecast. The program includes one-on-one consultations with one of the City's business advisors who will support the development of your new business plan as well as the opportunity to apply for up to \$5,000 in provincial grant funding to execute it. Qualifying startup and home-based businesses will also be enrolled in training sessions offered through the Business Planning Launchpad Series while food- and tech-based businesses will be offered sector-specific mentorship and training delivered in partnership with York University's YSpace.

Application intake is ongoing for those interested in applying for grant funding.


