Water Leak Detection Guide



The facts on water leaks

Water leaks can happen to anyone, and most leaks are silent, making them hard to find. Leaks can come from:

toilets

- bathtubs
- washing machines
- sprinkler systems

- dishwashers
- showers
- water softeners
- pools

They can cause a high water and wastewater bill and costly damage to your home if you don't stop them in time.

How to find a water leak

There are **two ways** to test for water leaks in your home:



1. Test your toilet

The most common cause of high water and wastewater bills is toilet leaks. Here's how to test your toilet:

Step 1: Remove the tank lid from the back of the toilet.

Step 2: Put one dye tablet or five drops of food colouring in the toilet tank at the back. You could also use Worcestershire sauce or another dark liquid.

Step 3: Close the toilet lid and wait 30 minutes – do not use or flush the toilet during this time. Then look at the water in the toilet bowl. If you see coloured water in the toilet bowl, you may have a leak. If the bowl water is clear and all the coloured water remained in the tank, that means the toilet likely doesn't have a leak.

Step 4: Repeat these steps with every toilet in your home.



2. Check your water meter

Step 1: Record the number on your water meter before going to bed, then avoid using water or running sprinklers, appliances or toilets overnight.



TIP: the water meter is typically located in the basement.

Step 2: In the morning, check the number on your water meter. If the number has changed, this indicates water has passed through the meter meaning you may have a water leak somewhere inside or outside your home.

Found a water leak?

If you suspect you have a water leak, contact a licensed plumber to investigate and resolve the leak as soon as possible.
