## A new neighbourhood park is coming to your community!

The City of Vaughan is ready to begin planning for Purpleville Park, a new neighbourhood park that will serve the local community in the Teston Road and Pine Valley Drive area, and we want your input!

Purpleville Park will be located at 140 Brant Dr., between Greville Street to the east and Ballantyne Boulevard to the west.

#### About neighbourhood parks:

- 1-5 hectares (2.5-12 acres) in size
- Serves residents within a 10-minute walking distance from the park





### Proposed amenities


Based on the guidelines and targets in the City's **Active Together Master Plan**, Purpleville Park is planned to have junior and senior playgrounds, racquet sport courts, a wheeled sports zone (e.g. skateboarding), a mini soccer field and a gathering space with a shade structure.



# Playground equipment and style

Purpleville Park will include a playground designed for children of all ages, with both junior (ages two to five) and senior (ages five to 12) play equipment. Standard play experiences include sliding, climbing, balancing, swinging, spinning and group play. There is also an opportunity to include inclusive play experiences for children of all ages and abilities, such as educational play (equipment that encourages learning through puzzles, numbers, letters or problem-solving) and sensory play (equipment that stimulates a child's senses, like touch, sound or sight).

# Playground equipment and style

The new playground can also be designed to look and feel a certain way, with some styles being better suited to specific play experiences. Three style options are being considered for Purpleville Park, which are described below:



Steel structure with connected slides, swings, play panels, climbers and more. This style of equipment offers the greatest value per dollar.



Steel frames with rope in different configurations. This style would offer slightly fewer pieces of equipment than traditional play.



Creative equipment built from natural materials like logs, rocks and plants to encourage exploration and connection with nature. This style would offer fewer pieces of equipment than traditional play and rope play.

# Shade structure size and style

The new park will also have a gathering space with a shade structure and picnic table seating. The City is seeking the community's input on whether one large structure or two smaller structures is preferred.





The single large shade structure would be approximately 50 square meters (538 square feet) in size and could accommodate larger groups or multiple smaller groups (eight to 12 people) at once.

The two smaller shade structures would be approximately 25 square meters (269 square feet) each and could accommodate smaller groups (four to six people), one at a time.



# Shade structure size and style

A modern shade structure may feature a unique geometric roof design.



A natural shade structure is often made from timber and characterized by its ability to blend in with the natural landscape.






# Racquet sport court design


The Active Together Master Plan and Tennis and Pickleball Strategy identified a need for racquet sports courts to serve the local community. Depending on the level of demand and the community's preferences, the City could design the courts for tennis only or for both tennis and pickleball. An overview of the racquet sport court design options is provided below:



Double tennis: Two dedicated tennis courts.



Single tennis and double pickleball: One dedicated tennis court and two dedicated pickleball courts.



Hybrid courts: Two tennis courts, both with a pickleball line overlay.

# Wheeled sports zone design

The **Active Together Master Plan** also identified a need for a wheeled sports zone (e.g. skateboarding, bike, scooter or inline skates) to serve the local community. This could be a traditional skate zone, otherwise known as a skate park, or it could be a pump track. An overview of both options is provided below:



A dedicated area for ramps, ledges and rails. Ramps enable users to gain height and perform tricks in the air, while ledges and rails facilitate grinding and sliding.



A looping circuit of smooth, raised rollers and berms made of asphalt that allow users to move through the course using a "pumping" motion of their arms and legs.



## Overall park layout

There is an opportunity to cluster the various park features together or spread them apart. In both layout options, the mini soccer field would be located on the east side of the park, the racquet sports court would be centrally located and the shade structure would be located next to the playground to allow parents to supervise children. An overview of each layout option is provided below:

#### Clustered

The clustered layout creates a vibrant community hub at the park that promotes socialization. It's especially convenient for families, as it may enable parents to supervise multiple children at once, giving them a sense of safety and security. However, the proximity of different park features could also lead to increased noise, overcrowding and competition for space.

#### **Distributed**

The distributed layout encourages exploration and movement throughout the park and provides more opportunities for smaller, quieter gatherings. Natural or open areas can serve as buffers between different spaces, reducing crowding and noise. However, it may be less convenient for families or groups wanting to use multiple amenities at once.
