Purpose

As per Report No. 29 of the Committee of the Whole, this report provides Council with an update to the consultation process to assess the interest and support of the residents and businesses in Vaughan of having an OLG facility located within the City of Vaughan as part of a world class cultural and entertainment district.

Background - Analysis and Options

As part of the Ontario Government's new direction to OLG in July of 2010, OLG was asked to complete a comprehensive strategic review of the lottery distribution network and land-based gaming facilities. The result of the review was an OLG report to government on March 12, 2012 titled, *Modernizing Lottery and Gaming in Ontario: Advice To Government*.

The report concluded that by 2017-18, OLG will be: A modern, sustainable organization, which will increase net profit to the Province by an additional \$1.3 billion annually – all while upholding responsible gambling standards.

The report identified where and how gaming will be offered in the province across all types of games and all channels through the creation of geographic areas called, "Gaming Zones".

In addition the report identified that the OLG initiatives will result in:

- New private sector capital investment an additional \$3 billion
- Employment growth by more than 2,300 net new lottery and gaming industry jobs.
- Employment growth of an estimated 4,000 service sector jobs in hotels, restaurants, entertainment centres, and retail.

Gaming Zones

OLG identified 29 gaming zones where existing or new gaming facilities would be permitted following municipal and other approvals. OLG based the zones on a business model that is designed to maximize revenue for the province. Factors such as proximity of a gaming location to other gaming facilities and residential areas were measured to determine the zones.

The proposed zones for the location of OLG gaming facilities have not been finalized. The geographic boundaries may be adjusted based on ongoing discussions with relevant stakeholders, municipalities and information received through the OLG procurement process. A portion of Vaughan has been identified as part of a gaming zone which also includes the current OLG site, Woodbine Racetrack and Slots.

OLG's Procurement Process for Modernization

On May 17, 2012, OLG announced a new competitive and transparent procurement process to seek input from potential vendors as it expands regulated private-sector gaming in Ontario. The multi-stage process includes:

 Request for Information (RFI) – (Now underway) allows the OLG to gather valuable information from potential regulated vendors and help determine the range of options available in the market and assess potential vendor interest, as well as risks. The RFI was issued on May 17, 2012 and closes on July 4, 2012. The RFI is published on MERX tendering system (www.merx.com). The RFI will be followed by and RFP in the fall of 2012.

OLG is continuing conversations with municipalities across the province to gauge interest in participating in the process, and will focus the RFP process only on communities which are interested in having a facility.

- Request for Pre-Qualification (RFPQ) (potential release summer 2012) gives vendors interested in the RFP an opportunity to submit information on their financial and technical capabilities. OLG will then select pre-qualified vendors.
- Request for Proposal (RFP) (potential release fall 2012) gives the selected vendors the
 opportunity to bid on specific products and/or services within the gaming business, and
 identify sites. Once the bidding process is complete, OLG will select vendors to become
 the regulated private sector providers for gaming and lottery gaming sites.

Entertainment and Tourist Potential for Vaughan

The City's Economic Development Strategy clearly articulates that in order to support the City as a destination, there are opportunities for enhancement of the existing entertainment amenities that are currently found in the area. Overall, there are a number of creative and cultural industry strengths disbursed across the city, making it difficult for residents and tourists to package these amenities into coordinated "Vaughan experiences". By creating stronger virtual and physical connections, a hub and spoke concept, radiating out from a central location, the city can enhance the overall quality of its cultural and tourism industries.

Therefore, the private sector (through the OLG RFP process) could fund and build an entertainment district anchored by a gaming facility in an appropriate area in Vaughan, such as the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre, and bring benefits that support the City's economic development strategy, and be a catalyst for arts, culture and tourism development such as;

- Build a performing arts/concert styled venue(s).
- A convention facility with the ability to host international sized conventions.
- Create annual revenue to the municipality from gaming proceeds.
- Anchor a Forbes Five Star rated accommodation(s).
- Generate large scale direct and indirect job creation.

The private sector infrastructure investment is expected to be realized in the next five to ten years to achieve the desired goals of the OLG modernization process.

Understanding Citizen's Views

Staff undertook a research initiative that engaged the Vaughan Community as it relates to the OLG's expansion of gaming in Ontario and the opportunity of siting a large-scaled entertainment and casino complex in the Greater Toronto Area. To that end, the following objectives were set:

- Assess residents' general attitudes toward casinos;
- Determine citizens views as pros and cons of having a casino in the GTA and specifically in the City of Vaughan; and
- Understand attitudes toward trade-offs between potential economic benefits and social issues associated with a casino.

The Consultant

Due to the timing of the OLG process and to prepare a report back to Council in a timely manner, Staff followed the Council approved purchasing policy guidelines to undertake a single source contract. The contract, in the amount of \$20,000, to undertake the qualitative and quantitative research was awarded to Pollara Research. Pollara is one of Canada's leading public opinion and market research firms providing strategic advice based on accurate measurement of opinions, attitudes and perceptions. Leading the project was Executive Vice President, Mr. Robert Hutton.

Mr. Hutton has extensive experience in advanced research design and analysis, particularly in the areas of loyalty, branding, advertising testing, segmentation, perceptual mapping, innovative non-linear online design, panel building, and social media. Mr. Hutton has undertaken research initiatives across Canada, Asia Pacific, Europe and the United States.

Research Methods

Given the nature of the subject matter, staff recognized that it was important to use more than one type of research method to better understand residents' views. Therefore, three different methods were adopted to meet the objectives:

• **Focus Groups** – The focus groups (2) which were held Saturday, July 21, had a good mix of age (18 or older), income, education, and representation from all five Vaughan communities. Each focus group was split by gender, as to better address potentially different reactions/attitudes and consideration set among men and women, and to ensure that those opinions were explored in sufficient depth.

Key Findings included; (Complete Report Attachment 1: Dated July 25, 2012)

Benefits associated with casinos outweigh the drawbacks

- A casino in the GTA would be welcome (but not in Toronto)
- Casino in Vaughan as a concept is viewed in a positive light, but when discussed in the context of crime, women's views can be swayed. Men don't see it as an issue.
- Traffic congestion is a big concern for everyone.
- All agree that the City has an obligation to explore the fiscal viability of this opportunity.
- The opportunity must be examined in the context of the City's other priorities

• **Survey** – An on-line survey was created using information gained from the focus groups. The survey took the respondent 10-12 minutes to complete and was completed by 500 residents during August 10 and 18. The survey was carefully designed to ensure that it covers various perspectives, was statistically sound and presented the discussion of a casino in a relevant and unbiased context, thus giving residents a comprehensive picture of what such an endeavor could mean to the City. Furthermore, the survey was designed to ensure that the respondents' answers were based on a good understanding of the subject matter rather than on reactionary, surface answers typical of a flash poll. The results were weighed by age and gender to 2006 Canada Census proportions to ensure that the results are representative of the opinions of the general public. The results are accurate ±4.38% nineteen times out of twenty. Key findings included; (Complete Report Attachment 2: Dated August, 2012)

- In general, the overall trends in attitudes hold true across demographic segments
- Overall, positive or neutral impressions of casinos outweigh negative ones.
- For a majority (78%), casino visits are seen as an entertainment destination, an outing that offers shows, restaurants, nightlife, with gambling being only a part of that experience. Only 22% go there exclusively to gamble.

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- In terms of advantages associated with a casino, a majority think of the economic benefits a casino brings: jobs (61%) and revenues for the city (55%) and businesses (54%).
- As for drawbacks- social issues and an increase in traffic congestion are on the minds of nearly seven-in-ten citizens (each), while worries about undesirable populations are mentioned by 61%.
- A majority (59%) agree that benefits of having a casino /entertainment district are too great NOT to consider it, even in light of potential drawbacks.
- Yet a vast majority (77%) agree (40% strongly) that the City of Vaughan has a financial obligation to assess the financial benefits of such development within the city's boundaries.
- Citizens feel even more strongly about the city's obligation to assess social impact of such development in Vaughan (85% agree, 51% strongly).

• **Information Session** – The information session gave residents the opportunity to learn about the topic from different perspectives. To this end, staff was in attendance at the information session which included presenters from the following organizations: Pollara, who presented the findings of the survey and OLG, who explained the concept and expansion of gaming in the GTA. The Information Session was attended by approximately 125 citizens and business owners. From the market researcher's experience, it is important to note that civic "open houses" tend to attract a highly unrepresentative section of the population, that typically comprise activists on both sides of an issue, and individuals with a motivated political agenda. They virtually never form a valid representation of a population.

At the conclusion of the session, Pollara found that the questions written on the cards, from those in attendance, were completely consistent with the focus groups and survey and could be grouped into three categories:

- 1. Economic impact questions- which were by far the majority, often very specific;
- 2. Location queries- which typically involved details about the suggested site and site impacts, and;
- 3. Social concerns- which were generally formed around perceptions and lack of factual information.

The opportunity for Vaughan to be the site of an entertainment and casino district located in an appropriate area of the City such as the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre or Highway 427 and Highway 7 could potentially provide the City with a significant non-taxation revenue source.

This fact was echoed throughout all of the research undertaken. Citizens views on Vaughan being the site for the OLG's entertainment and casino complex, either positive or negative, confirmed that the City had a fiscal responsibility to investigate all aspects related to the economic impact of an entertainment and casino complex in the City.

Experiences with Casinos

- All respondents in both groups have been to casinos, with some men visiting casinos more often than women.
- Most participants (in both groups) enjoy the whole casino experience, but not just come with casinos: shows, concerts, restaurants, etc. an outing that is about fun and pleasure associated with all the amenities and extras that casino and gambling only. They view the casino experience as a form of entertainment;
- A casino by itself would be of no interest to most.

- "It's an entertainment, like going to the movies."
- "It's for all ages. It's an outing."
- "It's not just about gambling. It's enjoyment."
- "It's lots of entertainment value."

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Experiences with Casinos

Vegas is the gold standard for casino entertainment that stimulate all senses, offering a screaming, sparking lights") and outside of them ("complementary food, drinks, shows, etc. It's a great show"). plethora of experiences, both within casinos ("bells, sounds of dropping coins, people

- "In the U.S. you can get any food, any meal of any value of any time. Here it's computerized and timed; you get meal value based on how much you spent."
- ""There is no humanness in Canadian casinos."

The dark side of casinos

- There is a general recognition of the social ills the society strongly associates with casinos: gambling, addiction, crime, etc
- Most come to the conclusion that, like with any other addiction, it cannot be reconciled.
- The problems are universal, and while having casinos creates more opportunities for amplifying the addiction, problem gamblers will always find ways to feed their addiction, competition, so see a revenue recapture opportunity. migrated online and that existing casinos have declined due to immediate cross-border whether there is a casino nearby or not. - For a vast majority of the population who can exercise self-control and engage in healthy gambling, casinos are just another choice of entertainment, which they shouldn't be denied. As with other addictions, the onus is on each individual to exercise self-control.

- " Not having a casino won't stop people from gambling if they have an addiction. Making something unavailable won't stop it."
- "I have mixed feelings for me it [casino] means good access to concerts, good opportunity to go out for dinner, but for people with a problem, it's putting it under their noses and creating accessibility. It can't be reconciled."
- "If anyone has an addiction, they have to control themselves, they are responsible for themselves."

Attitudes toward a Casino in the GTA

- Generally, both men and women felt that the GTA area (and many immediately assumed stand-alone casino), as it would give them more entertainment options without having access to go 'downtown' (Toronto), which is thought of by many as unsafe and difficult to Vaughan) would benefit from a casino entertainment complex (although not just a

- "There is no night life in Thornhill after 10 pm. There are no coffee shops, restaurants, etc. open even on Saturday night."
- "If there was a casino, it would improve everything. Downtown is vibrant. There is nothing here."
- "I don't like to go downtown. It's too far. I went for dinner, and came back at 2am. I would like to have something closer for drinks, dinner.
- "It creates social opportunities (outside Toronto) in an area with not so many evening activities to do. and crime downtown. I don't like going there. I wouldn't mind going for a show to a place closer by." I have to go to Brampton for a show. If it's downtown (Toronto), I wouldn't go. There is more drugs
- "I like my community, but at the same time I would like some entertainment closer so I don't have to go to Woodbine or downtown to a club. So a mini-Vegas sounds good."

Attitudes toward a Casino in Toronto/GTA/Vaughan

- Both groups, but especially men, saw the casino concept through the lens of a revenue generating opportunity for the area, and for the City of Vaughan in particular
- Other economic benefits associated with a casino complex in the GTA were emphasized over and over again in the groups, most strongly by men.
- Most respondents in both groups felt that Toronto would not be suitable for a casino, ineffective City management, among others citing distance, difficult access/parking, high crime rate, homelessness, drugs, sufficient entertainment infrastructure already in place (no need for more entertainment), and

- "Social ramifications of gambling opportunities nearby are irrelevant. Gamblers will drive to a casino wherever it is, in Niagara or Vaughan.
- "If you have an addiction, you will find a way to do it. You will find a way to get there."

When Jane/Finch entered the discussion, while all women agreed that it would be nice to have entertainment options closer, most felt having it in Vaughan was too close for comfort

- "I would like to have something closer so I don't have to go downtown, as long as it is not in my backyard
- "I'd prefer it in Mississauga. A little further away. I don't want it in my backyard."

- The location was questioned by women when proximity to Jane/Finch was raised.
- Most felt that it was too close to the Jane and Finch area, notorious for high crime, crime to Vaughan residential areas, with the subway extension making it that much easier to transport and that the crime would spill over to the casino complex, and consequently the
- The fact that the potential location would be a primarily industrial area, blocked off by two highways, did little to mitigate their concerns.
- "Jane and Finch is already dangerous. Subway will make it all connected. It will bring bad element here
- "People will be scared to go there. Jane and Finch and Jane and Highway 7 it's all too close. When you bring this type of business to the area, you will extent the Jane-Finch issue further."
- "I'm not comfortable with the Jane corridor. Casino would attract the gangs. It's too easy of the bad element to get there.

To be able to feel comfortable with the location (and casino in Vaughan overall), women would need to be convinced that their safety and the safety of other families living in Vaughan, and particularly near the development wouldn't be compromised

- They would expect to see:
- a police station set up in the area
- a lot of security
- well-lit parking
- Iots of lights everywhere in the complex
- shuttle buses from Vaughan transit points to take people to the casino complex

On the surface, many women would prefer to have a casino in Mississauga, or further North, although they also recognized the need for selecting a location that was economically viable, not too remote and with highway access

Those women who were not swayed by the Jane/Finch argument on the location felt it example affect the development and the neighbourhood. They brought Vegas as a positive was far enough from the residential areas that the Jane crime was not likely to negatively

- "Crime is an issue everywhere. I don't have a problem with this area."
- "You even have areas in Vegas where you wouldn't walk. If you stay on the main strip, with lots of lights and people, you are pretty safe."

- In contrast, men saw a casino <u>primarily</u> as an opportunity to recapture revenues from intrastructure (entertainment venues, bars, restaurants, etc.) other casinos, inject new revenues into the city, develop the entertainment and auxiliary
- They thought that there was strong potential to positively change the social dynamics of the city by marrying the economic and social opportunities associated with a casino
- While men recognized the possible downsides of a casino, they didn't believe it would outweighed potential issues. hurt the community. On the contrary, most felt that the benefits – particularly financial–
- They did not see the crime increase as a problem that would affect Vaughan. They felt City's reputation for safety. that the City would be able to effectively implement crime prevention and to uphold the
- They also mentioned (several times throughout the discussion) that the city had the right management to execute this type of project effectively
- The example of excellent zoning decisions was brought up, e.g., how well the city was able to effectively integrate Canada's Wonderland with residential areas.
- "Vaughan has done a fantastic job at zoning. It managed its growth through very smart and visionary zoning practices, which will continue and that will put faith in municipal leaders to do a good job."

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Most men found the potential location (Vaughan Corporate Centre) ideal for a casino highway. commercial development (e.g., the Colossus) and it would be easily accessible from the complex; it was nowhere near residential areas, would already be close to some existing

For the most part, men did not believe that this particular location would attract the Jane and Finch crowd and crime associated with it. - Other locations they saw as viable were somewhere along the highway 400 corridor, e.g., across from Vaughan Mills

- The biggest concern for men, and the second biggest for women (after safety) associated with having a casino in Vaughan (and in the Vaughan Corporate Centre in entail particular), was the issue of increased traffic congestion this type of development would
- All agreed that it would make the already heavy traffic even worse, particularly around Highways 400 and 7.
- The views were split on whether the traffic issue could be resolved.
- Many men and some women thought that the city management would be able to find a viable solution to the traffic issue by improving the infrastructure, building more roads, including casino-only highway exits, which would accommodate the casino traffic.
- Others were less optimistic that the traffic issue could be effectively resolved
- "It's a good location, but the extra traffic will pack it completely."
- "They have a problem there already. With a casino, it will be crazy."
- "We already have bad weekend and cottage traffic. Traffic would cause people not to come."

- Some men also felt that Vaughan had a better base for this type of development than Mississauga.

Should City of Vaughan investigate the casino opportunity?

- "They should let us vote on it to make sure that majority wins."
- "It's their [the City] responsibility to see if it is viable."
- "This is a fiscally responsible thing to do the conversation should be on the table."

There was a comment that if Vaughan wanted to stay progressive it would need to keep coming up with innovative ways to progress and a casino could be one of them

The casino concept presented the City with an opportunity to do it right and maintain and increase its reputation as a progressive City.

Several mentioned that in addition to the economic viability, the city would also need to investigate the impact of gambling and crime associated with casino development on the Rama) community (e.g., by examining other areas with casinos, such as Woodbine or Casino

Casino opportunity in the context of City's other priorities

The comment suggests that it would be unacceptable for citizens if the City placed priority on casino development, ahead of a much needed hospital.

"I'm a fan of a casino, but I would be very angry if they built casino here first, before a hospital. That's what the city really needs. I would have a problem if they could get the casino project going fast, and the hospital is taking a long time. As a citizen of Vaughan, a lack of hospital is my biggest complaint."

Casino's impact on the City's reputation

- Most men, and to a degree many women agreed that a casino complex in Vaughan if<u>done right</u> – could add character and prestige to the City.
- But *done right* entails a range of elements:
- Ensuring that the community's safety is not compromised the city would need having a casino in "people's backyards" to address and manage the concerns (particularly among women) associated with
- Identifying effective infrastructure solutions to ensure that traffic is not further impeded
- Some recognize that casinos may still have negative connotations/stigma associated with it – the city will need to address and manage those perceptions
- Creating a higher-end standard complex (of venues, entertainment, restaurants)
- (to deter low-income patrons and hopefully crime)
