A SUCCESS STORY – THE JEWISH COMMUNITY

- The Joseph & Wolf Lebovic Center:
- The City is Vaughan celebrates diversity by supporting a myriad of ethnic, religious and cultural groups. One such group is the Jewish community. March 14, 2011, Former Vaughan MP, Julian Fantino announced a 15-million donation under the Major Infrastructure Component of the Building Canada Fund and the Government of Canada's Action Plan. He announced that families across Vaughan would benefit from a multi-functional, recreational, cultural, health, education, and social services community center with a joint commitment from the Government of Canada and the UJA Federation. The 50-acre facility includes Jewish elementary and secondary schools, an ambulatory care centre for Mount Sinai, a recreation centre with a gymnasium and three swimming pools, a community organic garden, a skating rink, family services facilities, a theatre, conference centres, an urban square, long-term care facilities, homes for the physically and mentally challenged, a conference centre and an immigrant welcome centre. A Private Members Bill was passed on May 12, 2008 (Item 17 Report No. 24) to provide tax exemption through the City of Vaughan.
- At the press event with Minister Fantino, Vaughan Mayor Maurizio Bevilacqua stated: "Today, we not only celebrate community building, not only do we celebrate the great achievements of the Jewish community here in the city of Vaughan and beyond, but I do believe that today is a day when we truly celebrate nation building."



Dear Mayor Bevilacqua and members of Council:

Thank you for the opportunity to address you today during the Committee of the Whole meeting. As the Co-founder and Executive Director of the Vaughan African Canadian Association, it gives me great pleasure to bring forth a deputation from the members of our organization, young people from the City of Vaughan, our supporters, partners, and every day citizens from Vaughan and around York Region who support the building of an African-Canadian Community and Cultural Center (ACCCC) equipped with an indoor basketball facility to serve the needs of the community.

Mission

The ACCCC will assist individuals and families in reaching their full potential to become positive and influential contributors to society by providing social and wellness services and programs with a cultural significance.

Vision

From inception, The ACCCC will be a space for African-Canadians to share their cultural and historical heritage with the wider community and support the diversity and multiculturalism mandate of the City.

History

Our organization was formed in 2003 by teachers and administrators who began a Saturday morning tutoring program for youths and programs geared at providing support to the influx of black families moving into the City in 2003. We currently run programs and services aimed at providing support to black families and four years ago started our basketball program called "Ballers' Paradise" which provides camps, clinics, showcases and training to basketball players.

Some of our recent projects include working with the Township of Oro-Medonte to restore the African-Methodist Church in the Township that was built by freed slaves who fought in the War of 1812. The church stood dilapitated for over four decades. We submitted a joint grant to the Ontario Trillium Foundation and received \$90,000 earmarked for the restoration of the church. The project was a labour of love and we were excited to have a Grand re-opening ceremony August, 2016 with descendants of the families who built the church back in 1847. Descendants from United Kingdom, across Canada, the Caribbean and the United States attended the Grand re-opening as well as political leaders, community leaders and our MC Michael "Pinball" Clemons. This project was the most important work we have done to date.

Another important issue that we are extremely proud of is our work with the <u>National Council of Canadian Muslims (NCCM)</u>. We have partnered with the Muslim community, Chinese, Jewish, Sri-Lankan, Vaughan and York Region residents to bring the issue of Islamophobia and anti-black racism within the York Region District School Board to the forefront. The partnership of these organizations has seen a reorganization of the Board of Trustees at the YRDSB, the resignation of a Trustee who used a derogatory racial slur when describing a black parent, the firing of the former Director and a comprehensive review of the YRDSB ordered by the Minister of Education.

VACA has long been an organization that believes in social justice and equity for all. We believe in working together with other community organizations to provide programs and services that will uplift our children and families.

Community Cultural Centers in Vaughan/York Region:

We are privileged to live in a City that has publicly stated how diverse our City. We know that our diversity is our strength. We see all around us communities that are thriving because our City has provided support through donations, sponsorships, office space, land, grants, and partnerships. VACA has received support from the Mayor's Gala the first year of our CariVaughan Caribbean festival which is now in its 7th year, and is being organized by the newly formed Carifestival Organization headed by Sandi Folkes. We have also received support for our basketball March break camp last year which enabled us to provide subsidies for players.

Since the opening of the Joseph & Wolf Lebovic Center, the Jewish community has enjoyed the facilities and have invited residents and visitors to the Center. The JWLC joins numerous other Jewish facilities such as the the Shwartz-Reisman Jewish Community Center and many Jewish Community Centers (JCC) around the City and Country.

With street names like Chabad Gate, Torah Gate and Israel Zibar Drive surrounding the Center, the community has ensured that the legacy and history of the Jewish people will forever be honoured and remembered. Isaodre Sharp, the founder of Four Seasons Hotel and a major donor for the Center said it best "We have a major Jewish community here. We should be doing things to further their education, and further their well-being" (excerpt from speech given at the Grand-opening of the Joseph & Wolf Lebovic Center).


