## Ethics and Values

- A set of moral principles and values
- Standards that contain aspects of duty and obligation
- A discipline that deals with what is good and what is bad



#### **Professional Ethics**

- Code of Conduct
  - Principles that form the foundation of the way individuals or organization ought to conduct themselves according to a common understanding of duty and obligations

# Principles

- Trustworthiness
  - Keeping front and centre your role in serving the community
  - Avoiding situations and actions that cause the public to question the integrity of City Council
- Responsibility
  - Being accountable for your own actions



#### **Principles**

- Respect
  - Listening and respecting opinions of others
  - Focusing comments on an issue and not the person
- Loyalty
  - Supporting steadfastly the work and direction of City Council and the City of Vaughan



## **Principles**

- Compassion
  - Being conscious of the distress in others and a desire to assist in alleviating that distress
  - Caring about the needs of all individuals
- Fairness
  - Acting with impartiality and without bias



# Dilemmas

- Right v. Wrong relatively easy
  - Not using public resources for personal gain
  - Treating others with respect
- Right v. Right more difficult
  - Competing values
  - If your decision serves the public well, but ends up undermining City Council, what do you do?



- What are the Facts?
- What ethical values are involved?
- What are the competing rules to consider (City policies, statutes)
- What are your options?
- Which option best promotes public confidence?
- Which option best reflects your responsibilities
  as a Member of Vaughan City Council?
